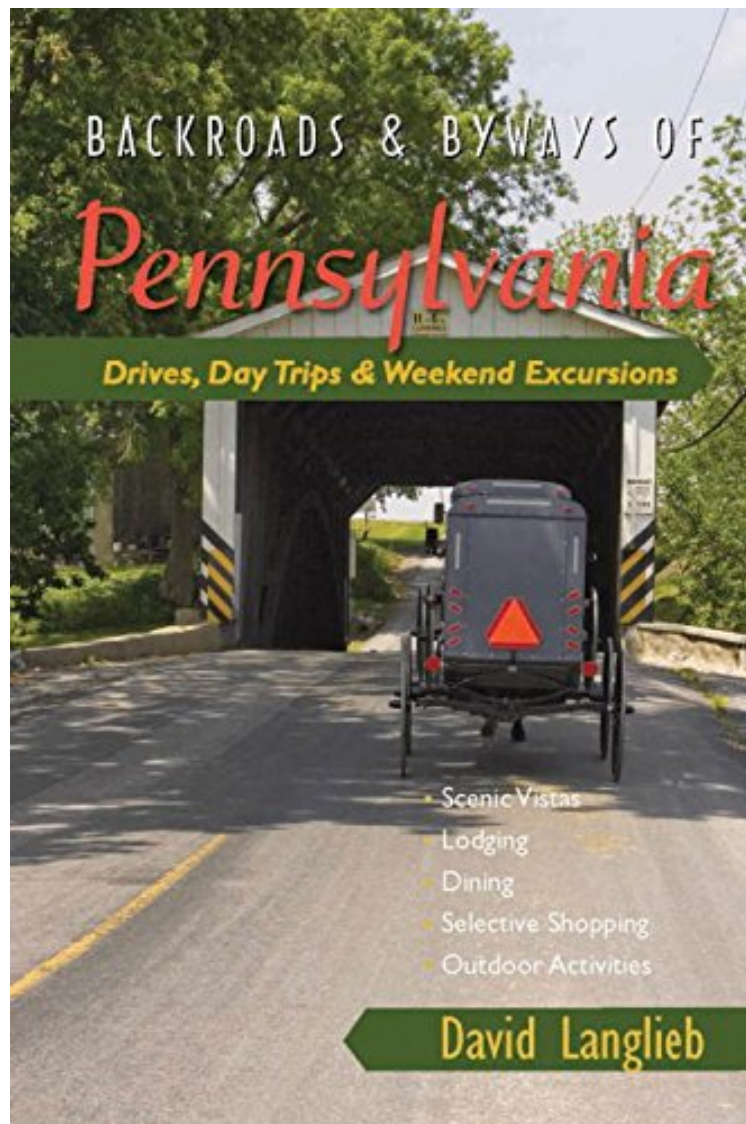

travel with no maps! Oh, there is a map...but it doesn't have most of the roads that you will be traveling on if you'd like to embark on the journeys suggested. The book is easy to read, (hence the 2 star rating) and has interesting sites with commentary that is entertaining. However, what the author should have included in each chapter is an inset map with the actual area that you would be visiting and the route highlighted so you knew where you were going. For people unfamiliar with the routes, that would have been an immensely helpful necessity. The directions to get to the different areas are vague. For example, in the chapter "Erie Hook" he says "this trip begins in the heart of Pennsylvania's wine country near the shores of Lake Erie in North East. This cheery little town is just a few miles from the NY state border and the southern point of the Chautauqua-Lake Erie Wine Trail. What??? Where the heck do I begin finding that!!! There is no index to the towns that you will be visiting. The only thing he lists in the front of the book are the chapters of each area you will be visiting...but you have absolutely no idea where those areas are...or what towns they encompass. He highlights some of the towns and sites in blue in each chapter, which is not helpful since there is no map to tell where exactly those sites are located. Also...not to highlight the heart of the Lehigh Valley is unbelievable for a travel book of Pennsylvania. The Bethlehem area alone features a quaint and beautiful main street (with the oldest continuously operated bookstore in the USA) and the amazing remnants of the historic steel stacks.. Save your money and instead visit the many Pennsylvania travel sites on-line which highlight all of the Pennsylvania must-sees and gives explicit directions to the sites. 5 of 5 people found the following review helpful. Most attention is paid to scenic beauty, but he also throws in a little history which enhances the trip. He also recommends sleeping and eating establishments along with visitor centers. I think the best chapter is the Laurel Highlands with descriptions of Fallingwater, Fort Necessity and Ohiopyle. Nice assortment of photos.
