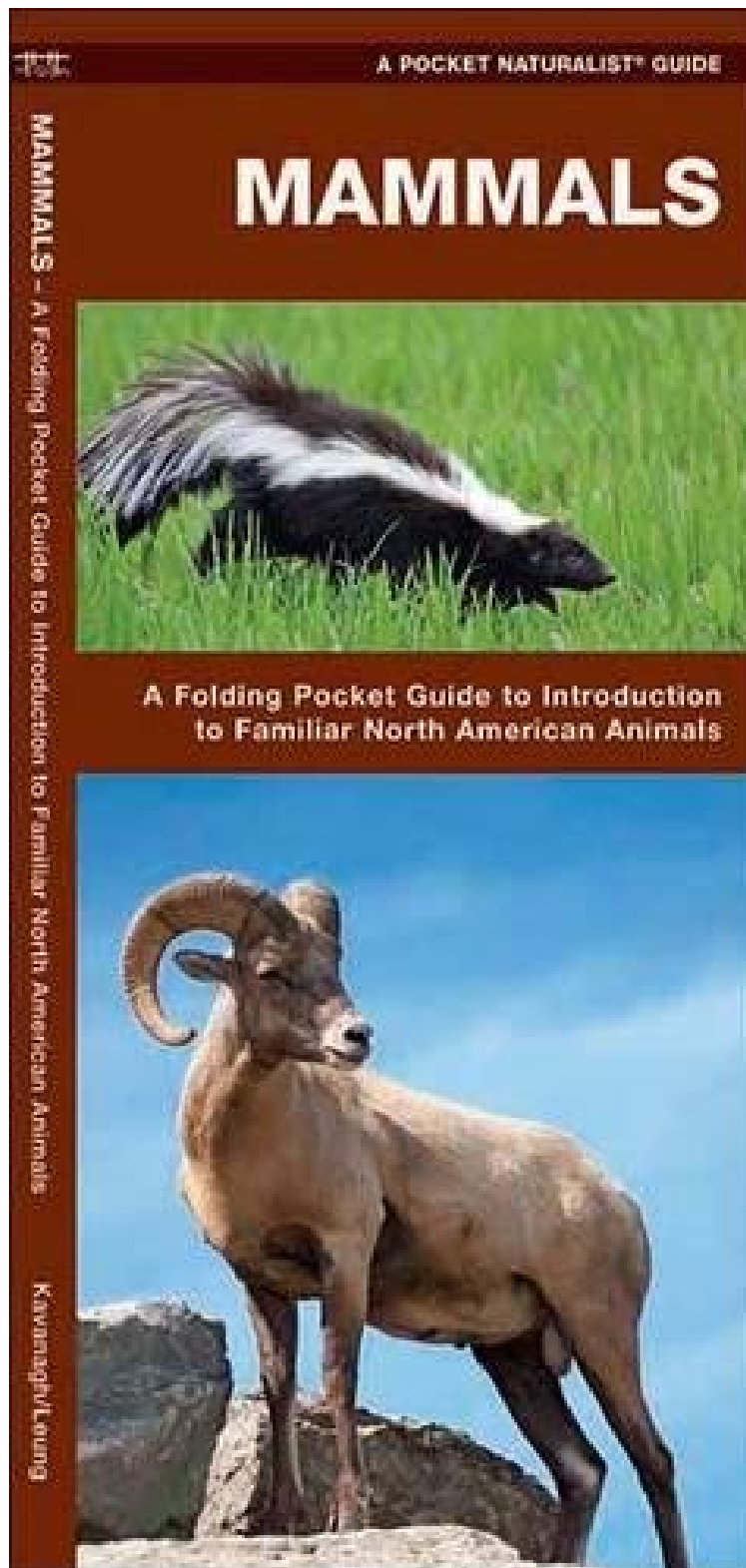

Most are in areas I know little about. The author covers wildlife by families. Bird life usually has its own folding Guide. I think he starts with Marsupials. I think there is only 1 This is followed by Moles, Shrews and Bats-- all on the first page. (He notes how many species there are of each of these families.) Format In other families there are several examples given. He usually has a 3 line preamble to a family. If it has a number of species he mentions the number. Then some are illustrated-- usually some 8-10, sometimes more. There is a good coloured drawing. The briefest of details are given-- length and possibly one really important fact. 2 moles are shown-- one has some 20 projects on the tip of its nose-- you will know it but I cannot quite recall the facts. He proceeds through the various family groups. I think this book just covers mammals-- both land based and marine mammals. I find his little guides fill a niche, and I am very pleased to have them. I know a fair bit about African wildlife, but in areas I know little about, his simple but fairly comprehensive approach helps you to start getting animal names and appearances into your memory. Yes the facts are very limited-- basically the animals length and sometimes another fact. No weight. One reason I got it was to check on foxes and wolves. It had the Kit Fox-- the note mentioned the Swift fox, other in this group were covered and illustrated. So, it depends whether you are a beginner or not.
