By Jeff Paschke This 50-page travel guide is just an excerpt from the complete Moon Colombia travel guidebook --- don't waste your money. This book also doesn't even have an index. Since this is just a short excerpt it unfortunately copies the errors from the Moon Colombia travel

guide, so this short travel guide has many inaccuracies and is missing many of the best places. I have lived in Medellín for nearly five years and this Medellín travel guide is a disappointment. This 50-page book has poor restaurant recommendations. You would do better using TripAdvisor. For example, the Stella restaurant in Medellín listed in this book closed quite a while ago -- in February 2014. I also don't know how Carmen, one of the best restaurants in the city could be missed. The book has even worse hotel recommendations. Famous Mangos is listed in the book under dance clubs saying it is popular with foreigners and locals alike but this is very dated information as Mangos was a huge dance club that closed in March 2012 and reopened in 2013 in a much smaller format without the stages it previously had. Mango's is more a bar/cafe now and is not much of a dance club and is definitely no longer popular with foreigners. What about also listing more than one mall in Medellín, which is a city that has over 20 Western style malls, what about Oviedo, El Tesoro, Premium Plaza and others? For the coverage of Guatapé in the book how could it miss the large Hotel Los Recuerdos resort that is next to El Peol and the large yacht this hotel has to go out on the lake? These are just a few examples of the many issues in this short book.
